MISCELLANEOUS

- The gas stove in the Docents' office is again in operation. Turn the thermostat
 to your desired setting when you arrive, and <u>be sure</u> to turn it back down prior to
 leaving. Use one of the electric fans to blow some heat into the gift shop.
 Insure that all combustible materials are kept a safe distance from the stove.
- The new women's restroom door has a keyed lock. We have found that it can be (accidentally) locked from the inside... with ensuing "turmoil". As a result, a key to that door lock is now on the Docents' key ring.

- Our staff burn team burned several plots in early September that are now, after some good rains, turning green. The Bison should be finding these newly greened plots. The Fall burning/greening/grazing gives you a new topic to discuss with the visitors.

- A NOTE ON SARA WILSON AND THE VIRGIN ISLANDS OFFICE

As of September 19th, phone communication with the Virgin Islands was still impossible. However, we have received fragmentary news on the status of Conservancy people and facilities. On St. Thomas, the island hardest hit, Sara Wilson and the rest of the staff are physically alright. The Conservancy office was severely damaged by the storm leaving the island completely without power and water. One out of every four houses was destroyed, approximately 80 percent lost their roofs, and nearly all suffered some damage. The Federal Emergency Management Agency hopes to activate a cellular phone network

soon. The Home Office is in direct contact with FEMA and The Red Cross and are supporting their relief activities. Please contact Acting Director Gina Green, at the Home Office (703) 841-4865, if you wish to offer any assistance or suggestions.
