Our beginning inventory was valued at \$4,149.93; purchases throughout the year cost \$22,961.80; and ending inventory was valued at \$4,569.32. Our net income for the year was \$17,964.07! This income purchased bison last fall, as reported in an earlier Docent News. Thanks for all your hard work!

According to the register, 317 visitors came in January, 85 from 21 other states, 14 from three foreign countries and 218 from Oklahoma. 55.2% were first time visitors. 

#### **Trail Guides**

The Trail Guide program is alive and well. You may sign up for the program at Docent Reorientation. Training will be held on April 5. Our main focus at this time will be the Children's program. There is already a demand for these tours, and we have several volunteers to meet this need.

However, the adult program is not dead. Last year we had a Catch 22 - not enough volunteers to advertise, but because we didn't advertise there was not a demand for volunteers!

Is an adaptation of the Children's tour appropriate for adults? There are two trains of thought on this issue: Do we offer something different and thought-provoking that helps someone understand interrelationships and concepts of prairie ecology, or do we give them the scientific names that they want and forget about trying to get them to understand concepts?

Learning all the names of our plants requires much more time on the part of the guides. Concepts aren't as difficult to remember as scientific names. People forget scien tific names mentioned once or twice on a tour; concepts,

if truly understood, stay with you for a lifetime.

However, to be fair, I know that some adults "think" all they need to know is the name of the plant. They act irritated if that is not what they get.

If you are a proponent of the "name it" philosophy, do you have suggestions on helping our guides learn these names? Much self-training must occur. Are you willing to take the time to be self-taught regarding plant names?
