"WHEW! As the weather heated up fewer visitors signed our visitor log. 960 visitors for the month was the lowest August visitation we have recorded. We are down 9% from last year.

"39 visitors came from other countries, 338 came from other states and 583 came from Oklahoma.

"Year-to-date figures show that we have had 7,300 visitors- 2488 from 49 other states and the District of Columbia, 4551 from Oklahoma, 4 from Puerto Rico, and 257 from 39 other countries.

"62 percent are first time visitors, according to the registration sheet. Comments were complimentary. Docents are doing a great job!

"Saturday and Sunday are still the most popular days, followed by Wednesday and Thursday. Mid-day was the most popular time to visit."

- Roundup will begin the week of Oct. 19, with the herd being slowly moved into the "Spring" trap.
- The cowboys are preparing the corrals for the upcoming roundup.
- There were two controlled burns on Sept. 2, 188 and 62 acres plots near the Headquarters.
 Summer burn totals: 5 burns and 820 acres.
- All '98 calves are a new dark brown adult color.
- Bill Dinger is completing his work on the architectural plans for the new gift shop and nature room.
- The cowboys have been building new bison fence on the south side of the "107" pasture. When it gets done, the bison will be turned into this additional 2500 acres.
- Ms. Kyoki Robertson, from Neb., has been volunteering at the TGP since Sept. 10, painting cattle guards and bison fence.
- A wonderful 4 inch rain on Sept. 13, plus showers since, have replenished moisture on the prairie.

 The goldenrods are in peak bloom. Ragweed pollen is abundant, too!

Reason Six to Save the Diversity of Life - -

Diversity is Beauty (The Aesthetics Factor)

Strip malls have their utility, but imagine how boring it would be to see nothing but sameness each day. Humans are intrinsically drawn to variety in landscapes, and wild places provide beautiful variety that enriches our lives. It is hard to imagine art flourishing without nature to act as muse.

"Where has nature spread so rich a mantle under the eye? Mountains, forest, rocks, rivers. With what majesty do we ride there above the storms!" - Thomas Jefferson, describing the view from Monticello in Notes on the State of Virginia, 1782.



Fall Events

Chiggers are no longer a problem after the first frost. Eastern cottontails turn from reddish brown to grayish, and fre-

quently nest around corrals and stacks of oilfield pipes. Jack rabbits prefer open prairies and fields of short grasses.

Seed dissemination from grasses happens now. In moist seasons, the "turkey foot" seed stems of the big bluestem reach up 10 feet or more. Roots reach that far down.

Grasshoppers are eaten by voles, mice and woodrats. They, in turn, are eaten by coyotes, foxes and weasels.

Lightning-causes fires burn red cedars and other brush off the grasslands and back into the breaks and hillsides.

Leadworts and phlox attract large, yellow cloudless sulphur butterflies Goldenrods and sunflowers peak in September.

Moths and butterflies flutter south, hibernate, or lay eggs.

Fall colors peak in October.

Migrating monarch butterflies encloud oaks on October evenings.
